INTRODUCTION

Paul Frank Wagner is a French born, New York City raised contemporary artist. He is also the co-founder of Hoopla Education, an education company specialised in sustainibility, with projects running in 16 countries.

Paul's life long relationship with the ocean dates back to 1975, when his parents first brought him to St. Barth's. He has visited the island many times and created his first installations in nature in 1991 using nylon ropes in the natural landscape of *Washing Machine*, a well known spot for bodysurf.

Paul was exposed to modern and contemporay art in his youth, having grown up in NYC in the late 1970's to 1980's. As a teenager, he met many well known artists like Bernar Venet, Arman, and Christo which nurtured in him a real passion for Conceptual Art, American Minimalism, and paved the path to his first solo exhibition at NYU Broadway Windows in 2005.

In 2009, Arnauld Lapierre and Grey Gallery Monaco presented his work to the art world at *Scope Miami* part of Art Basel Miami Beach show with a solo exhibition of 100 Rope Paintings.

In 2013, with the birth of his youngest son, Paul turned his passion to arts education, running Contemporary Art workshops around the world. During this time, his art practice was mainly focused on ink drawings and process driven works. He wrote **Sticks & Stones** during his stay in Sardinia, as a way to bring Land Art, Environmental Art, American Minimalism and Conceptual Art to children starting from age 3. From 2017 to 2019 he launched the curriculum in San Francisco as a way to reconnect children with nature and the aesthetics.

Today, Paul lives and works in Monza Italy, where he weaves sticks, stones, rope and natural materials into his art practice.





Scope Miami Beach, 2009

I kept the wood frame of traditional paintings and replaced the canvas and paint with dyed ropes. These 3-Dimensional wall reliefs are an exploration of colour and texture with imagination and unconventional knots. I coined them rope paintings and began creating them as suspended installations.

In 2009, Arnauld Lapierre and Grey Gallery approached me to create a series of 100 rope paintings for a solo exhibition at the Scope Art Fair part of Art Basel Miami Beach 2009 Edition.

With Intersections, Paul built a story using 14 different pieces of nylon rope, which he dyed in the 14 corresponding colours of the Parisian Metro lines.

It was the story of ropes that travelled through Paris and intersected at the **Cloitre des Billettes** in the Marais. The installation was suspended by the the 14 columns of the cloister and was created as a live performance, as sound bites of the city were played, and where it remained suspended for two weeks in May 2014.

STONES

Paul Frank Wagner's work with stones draws inspiration from his time in Sardinia, where he began grounding his work and where he also authored Sticks & Stones art curriculum, a reflection on contemporary rural life inspired by Land Art and Environmental Art movements that are so relevant to today's issues on climate change. Paul's desire to have children play with natural materials like stones is in direct response to the tangible influences of modern day life that have affected everyone's lifestyle, young and old.

Paul reminds us of the urgency to positively act on our planet by binding his stones vigorously with ropes. Paul strives to make sense of our passage on Earth, trying to make it as meaningful as possible. The work is a contrast between natural beauty and concept. The feeling of urgency for climate change is calmed by the underlying knowledge that nature will prevail no matter how negative our impact on it.
